

We get it, and We Got Us

New Breath Foundation (NBF) is a national community-led public foundation that leads the movement to fund grassroots groups transforming the lives of Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders (AANHPIs) directly impacted by incarceration, deportation, and systemic violence in the U.S. Our fight is rooted in the collective liberation of all people of color. Launched in 2017, NBF is the first grantmaking foundation established and led by a formerly incarcerated "juvenile lifer," Eddy Zheng. Our team of activists and advocates has substantial movement-building experience and knowledge.

NBF is unapologetically committed to building long-term power in our communities while dismantling institutions of policing, incarceration, and deportation to create real safety.

About the We Got Us Fund (WGUF)

New Breath Foundation launched the *We Got Us* Fund (*WGUF*) in 2021 in response to rising anti-Asian violence. With a fundraising goal of \$10M, the *WGUF* offers grants to AANHPI grassroots organizations across the U.S. whose work supports currently and formerly incarcerated AANHPIs and communities targeted for criminalization and immigration detention/deportation. Our grantees' approach is rooted in cross-racial solidarity with local communities of color and within their communities.

The grassroots organizations we support:

- Fight scapegoating
- Support culturally relevant healing
- Promote cross-racial solidarity
- Protect communities from systemic and interpersonal violence

The Fund's Progress So Far

Our philanthropic approach relies on going directly to the source—the community. NBF uses a participatory grantmaking process to select organizations, working with grantees through trust-based practices and taking their cues. As of 2024, the *We Got Us* Fund granted \$5.65M to smaller grassroots organizations, most with annual budgets of less than \$1M. Many are volunteer-run on less than \$100K. Because these smaller AANHPI frontline groups are typically overlooked by traditional philanthropy, a *WGU*F grant significantly affects their capacity to create transformative impact and narrative change.
